### Benson, Tech Services Held

#### 480 Seniors Attend Baccalaureate

June graduates of Benson and Technical High Schools attended baccalaureate services at Dundee Presbyterian and Central Congregational Churches, respectively, Sunday afternoon.

Dr. John M. Phillips, pastor of Central Congregational Church, speaking on "Armed, but with What?" told the 250 Tech seniors that the nation can now make four assumptions about them:

"That you know something; that you can do something; that you believe something; that you are somebody."

"Must Be Own Thinking" Dr. Phillips said: "It isn't enough just to know facts—you must be able to reason from the facts. People who have as much education as you are under a moral obligation not to let some one do your thinking for you."

"Many of you are thinking of the future in terms of earning power . . . In normal times any one can make a good living, but few can make a good life."

"When you believe something, you tend to become some one. In America we have much faith in physical, political and money power. Faith in yourselves grows out of faith in God."

Dr. Edwood Rowsey, pastor of Dundee Presbyterian Church, told 230 Benson seniors that "no nation or individual can be destroyed until they turn toward the road of self-destruction."

"Choice Rules Destiny" "We are reaping the harvest of our careless years. What happens to us will be determined by what happens through us. Our choice will determine our destiny."

Private Bradbury, a former Ohio champion from Springfield, totaled 337.3 points on 10 dives. Closest competition came from Bill Freidel of Tech, who scored 291.3 points.

No team was named because Tech was the only full crew represented. Lincoln had only two entries. Transportation difficulties prevented Sioux City from sending a team.

Don Longcrier of Tech won the 400-yard marathon. Longcrier splashed the 16 lengths in 5:30.2. Longcrier also annexed the men's 200-yard freestyle title.

Don Heins of the Lincoln Y took the 200-yard breaststroke event, and placed second to Longcrier in the 400-yard event.

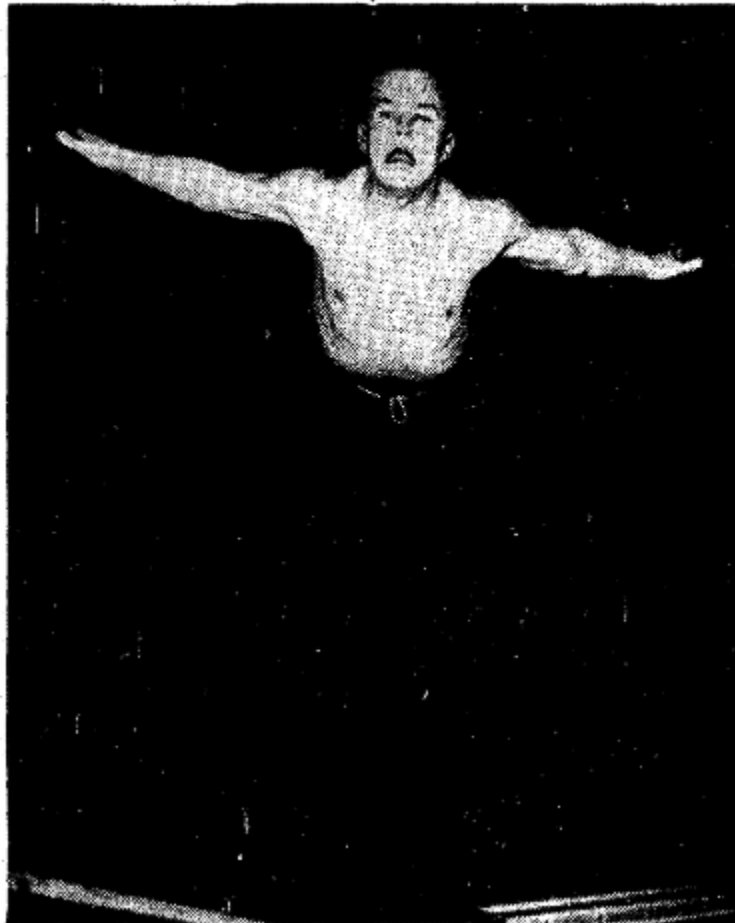

## Pa Neptune Scores Again!

Down through the years Coach C. C. Hubbard has offered a dozen or more swimming pageants.

But his 1945 production, "The Evolution of Swimming," is his finest, the veteran Tech High coach modestly admits.

"It has everything," the baldish swim master enthused Saturday in revealing that the general public will get a first look at the extravaganza next Saturday night at Tech.

"It's in four acts, and 50 swimmers will demonstrate the growth of swimming from Cave Man days right up to the present. And there'll be an eight-piece band tooting descriptive tunes while the gaily-bedecked actors do their stuff."

The retiring Mr. Hubbard didn't mention his role in the pageant,

but by all odds it appears the most important—according to the script.

Because, in Act II (which deals exclusively with life saving), the versatile Mr. Hubbard is cast as Pa Neptune and engages Davy Jones (Dean Kelley) in a terrific under-water struggle.

You see, Davy Jones wants no truck with this life-saving. He's lonesome; wants company in his locker room. But Pa Neptune wins out, as the champion of life-saving, tosses Davy Jones out of the pool, a beaten, disillusioned chap.

And there'll be a lone gal among the 49 male characters, too. Mr. Hubbard is keeping her identity secret. To learn her identity, it'll cost adults 40 cents, children 30 cents.

The "Evolution of Swimming," a water pageant in four acts, proved a huge success at the Tech High pool Saturday night.

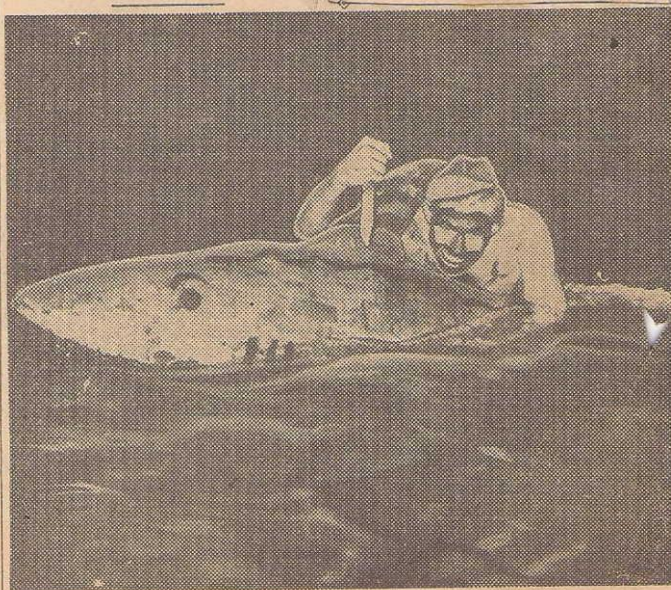

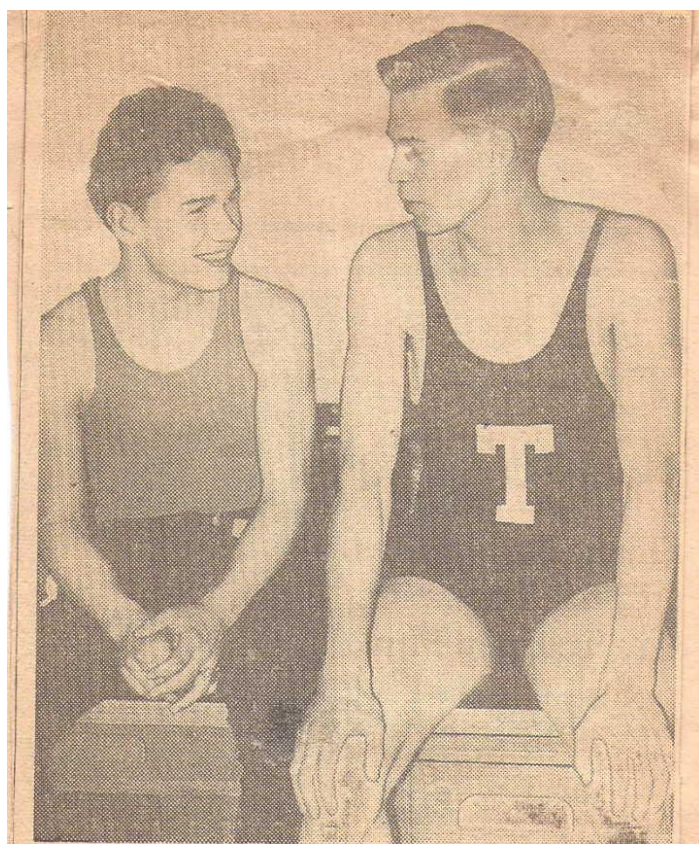
The pageant was dedicated to Dwight E. Porter, retiring principal at Tech. Members of the swimming team also gave him a going-away present.
